My dear Doctor

On the first of starting
I must write a few lines to you
to tell you, that I have been here
for two weeks, very industriously
very much pleased, and hope
I have obtained good results.—
The Hookers have been very kind
and obliging and have assisted
me — every way. Gridbeck is
here since a few days; he has
conspired with you I see, and
expects weighty plants — via
Hamburg he has given me his
name of the Antilles for you.—
How is Wright — has he done
any thing in Castine or in
Assonet etc. Hooker complains
of his live plants being miserable
as it would not be safe to send
any of them to Germany.—
Harvey had left New before I came
here — Dr Wiese was here these
days (going to Copen & Jave for
2 years). Dr Meek I often see
here; Anderson whom I had seen

Paris left just when I came.—
Dr Hooker was here with me only a few
days—

Cards are only so so here — very
striking specimens from this side
but not many novelties or great
variety.—

But the Museum I would say
are the pride of New.

Now about Euphorbia. That plant
is certainly Aiton Epipactis (read
by Linnaeus, Hale, Dumortier — I had
provisionally named it so.) I have
seen all the species in Brit Museum
when Mr. A. Brown was extremely
kind & communicative. Booth
I saw also — and poor Carey.
I hunted up and consulted with
him — it is really pitiful to
see a man so broken down
as he seems to be. He was quite
overcome.—

Cassonaria according to Browns
I Hooker's advise remain as

bear the name: Cassonaria gamostyla
