

My Dear Dr. Watson:

New York, March 23, 1891

I must apologize for keeping your Polygalas and Xyrids so very long. We have been through with the Polygalas some time, but the Xyris group is a very bad one, and has needed very close work. I hope to get them all back safely in the course of a week.

I don't see how the plant you have recently distributed in Pringle's things as Aesmodium lividiflorum can be the same as our Atlantic Coast species. The trouble seems to have come through Bentham's naming Gregg's plant as at Kent. Pringle's

is the same as every of
Lindheimer's which I do not seem to have had a
name put on it. The species seems to me nearer
D. carnesceus. Unless you
have some serious objection
to interpose I propose to
get the South western species
described as D. Lindheimeri.
Will you kindly have the
Atlantic and P. W. plants
compared as your
specimens illustrate them
and drop me a line?
